SC/MLA

Continuing Education Scholarship Fund

The Southern Chapter/MLA Continuing Education Scholarship Fund was established for the purpose of supporting the expenses of Southern Chapter members seeking to become qualified MLA CE instructors. MLA currently reviews CE instructor applicants on the basis of subject expertise, teaching experience/teacher education and past MLA CE activities. Applications for the SC/MLA CE Scholarship Fund are available from: Nancy W. Clemmons, Chairman, SC/MLA CE Committee, Lister Hill Library of the Health Sciences, University of Alabama at Birmingham, Birmingham, AL 35294. (205) 934-2230. Application deadline is April 15, 1985. Applicants are evaluated against the following guidelines:

1. SUBJECT EXPERTISE, including two or more of the following:
 - a. developer or co-developer of course(s) to be taught;
 - b. completion of current version of course intending to teach, or comparable academic coursework;
 - c. job experience at a high level or responsibility relevant to course content.
2. TEACHING EXPERIENCE
 - a. completion of CE 626, "Teaching Skills for Library Educators", or
 - b. successful completion of graduate level academic course work in preparation for adult education.

The SC/MLA award will be based on the following considerations:

1. The applicant must be a member of SC/MLA.
2. The applicant should have already completed the Continuing Education Instructor Development Program from MLA and met the subject expertise and teacher experience qualifications. This should be documented in writing by MLA;
3. The particular course under consideration should be one that is of interest to SC members;
4. The amount awarded to an individual to take CE 626 - Teaching Skills for Library Educators, to enable the individual to meet the teacher education qualifications, should be sufficient to cover transportation expenses and should not exceed \$500;
5. The amount awarded must be utilized by October 31 of the same year; or forfeited, and the awardee must compete again the following year;
6. Applicants will be reviewed by the CE Committee and, if deemed necessary, by the SC/MLA Chairman. Evaluation may include contacting instructors and other relevant experts regarding the candidate's qualifications.
7. If none of the applicants meet the above criteria, no award will be made.

Tel-Med

Tel-Med: Free, Confidential Consumer Health Information

For over one million Alabama residents, free, confidential health information is only a phone call away. The Tel-Med program, or "Telephone Medicine", utilizes pre-recorded audio-tapes with scripts especially designed for the lay listener desiring basic health information. On weekdays between 10:00 AM and 5:00 PM any of 400 tape messages may be requested for phone play on topics such as child development, diseases, contraception, and drug abuse. Tape messages are not intended to substitute for physician consultation, but are selected to provide health maintenance information, the warning signs for common disorders, and basic health data. There are six Tel-Med programs in Alabama, and except for local telephone charges, tapes are played at no cost to the caller. Tel-Med calls require no identification so anonymity is preserved.

In a recent survey of the six Alabama Tel-Med programs, tapes on sexual response, heart disease, sexual diseases, and cancer were those most often requested. Other frequently requested tapes were "Am I Really Pregnant?", "When to See a Psychiatrist", and "To Drink or Not to Drink". Tel-Med continually reviews and revises existing tapes, insuring that the information each tape contains is accurate and reflects the latest medical developments. In 1983, sixty-five tapes were updated and rerecorded. Tel-Med created twenty-five new tapes in 1983, on topics such as AIDS, Medicine Package Safety, and Premenstrual Syndrome to name a few.

Almost 9,000 calls were received by Alabama's six Tel-Med locations in 1983, clearly demonstrating the demand for basic health information. All locations have brochures describing the Tel-Med program which list the tapes on hand for phone requests. The brochures are available in quantity at no charge. Call Tel-Med at the locations closest to your library weekdays between 10:00 AM and 5:00 PM for more information (hours may vary).

Loan Collection: 5000 3/4" videocassette in AVLINE

Availability of loans: Loans are filled on "A First Come First Serve" basis. Advance booking for specific show dates cannot be accommodated.

Length of Loan: Three weeks including transit (mail) time. Renewals are not accepted if other patrons are waiting to borrow title.

Restrictions: Borrowing libraries are responsible for compliance with all copyright regulation, and must check the CCL box on the loan form.

Postage: Borrowing library must pay return postage and have the videocassette(s) insured for return shipment.

Damages: Videocassettes damaged or lost during use are the responsibility of the borrowing library.

Billing: Invoices are issued to institutions by the National Technical Information Service (NTIS) on a quarterly basis. No advance payment will be accepted. Deposit accounts can be established with NTIS. Checks must be payable to NTIS.

Cost: \$5.00 per title.

Remarks: Each request must include authorization for billing and copyright compliance. All requests must be completely typed out and submitted in triplicate on a standard ALA Interlibrary Loan Form or other authorized electronic means. Requests cannot be accepted by phone.

MEDICAL MEDIA FELLOWSHIPS FOR 1985-86

Two master's level fellowships will be available from the University of Alabama Graduate School of Library Service for students interested in practicing medical media/librarianship in small hospitals. The fellowships, funded by Title II-B of the Higher Education Act, provide tuition and a stipend of \$4,000 to each recipient. Preference will be given to minority applicants currently working in small rural hospitals and to those working in small hospitals serving a predominately minority or economically depressed population. Other forms of financial aid are available for additional qualified applicants wishing to study medical/media librarianship at the University of Alabama.

The program in medical/media librarianship is designed to prepare graduates to work in small hospitals, designing and producing media in support of patient and staff educational programs and administering the library. Students will take the regular core curriculum, a sequence of three courses in instructional design and media production, and a course and internship in medical librarianship.

Other options in education for medical librarianship offered by the School include a 36-credit program in general medical librarianship and a 48-credit combined media and medical librarianship program for those planning to work in large medical libraries.

MIGRAINE

Dorland's Illustrated Medical Dictionary, 26th ed., defines migraine as "an often familial symptom complex of periodic attacks of vascular headache, usually temporal and unilateral in onset, commonly associated with irritability, nausea, vomiting, constipation or diarrhea, and often photophobia; attacks are preceded by constriction of the cranial arteries..." The literature on migraine is vast and widely scattered. What follows is a selection of recent monographs, chapters and articles on the subject. Journals which frequently publish articles on aspects of migraine include Cephalalgia, Headache and Pain.

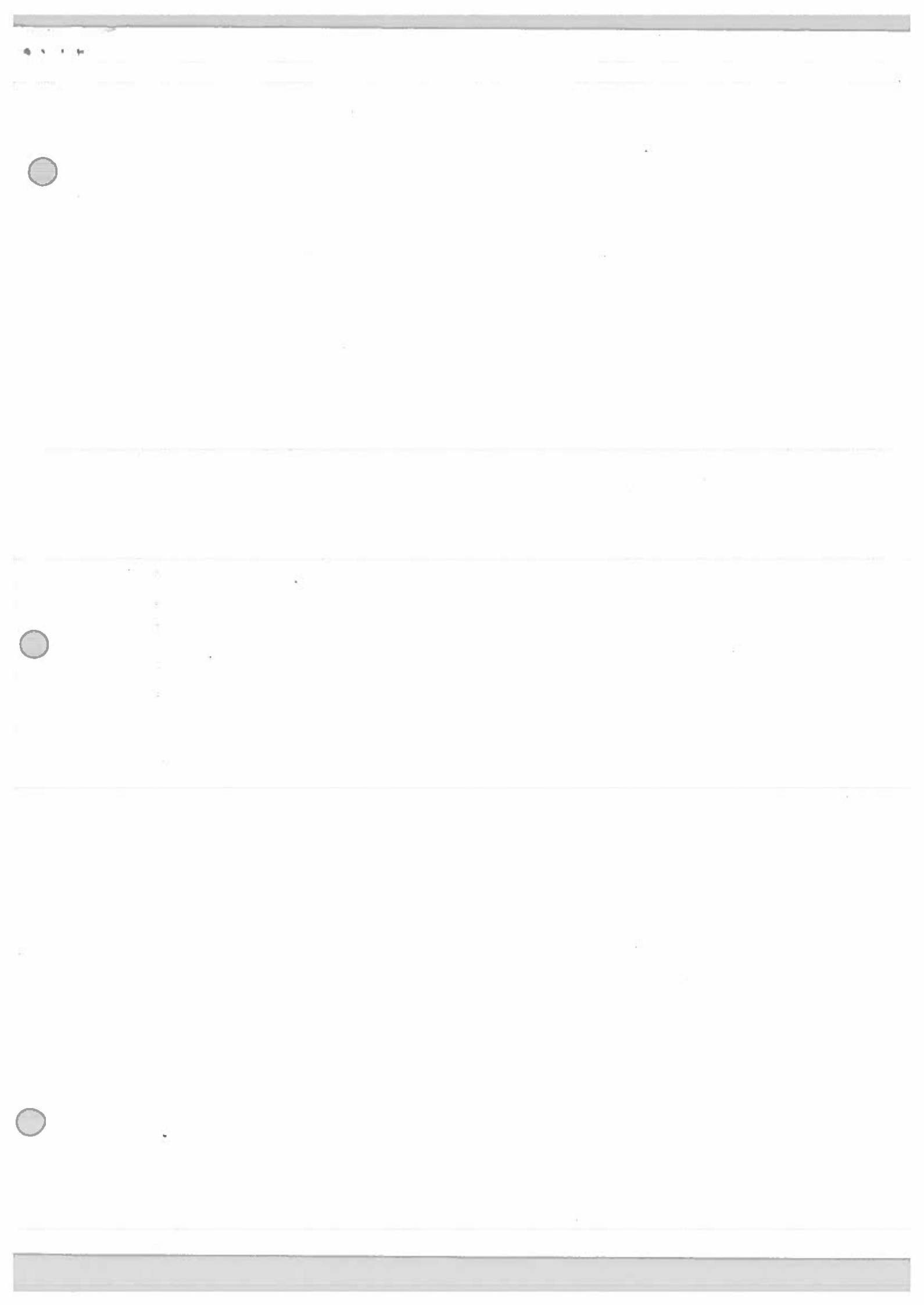
